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Oregon

I don't know if Oregon State still does a teachers' tour but they did in the late 70s and early 80s, run by Walt Hopkins, a former industry forester/bull-of-the-woods kind of guy. As a new graduate student from back-East, I was included in that year's group to help me better understand Western forestry. Among

other places, we toured Weyerhaueser's Mt. Saint Helens Tree Farm in Washington. Darius Adams (now emeritus professor) once recounted how he went on an earlier trip in the Coast Range when he first got to OSU. Walt put him, the newly minted assistant professor, on the spot at one stop, asking Darius what he thought the per acre volume of the stand was. Darius said that he made a wild, even clueless guess that was actually within 5% of the cruised volume, thereby earning immediate credibility with Walt!
